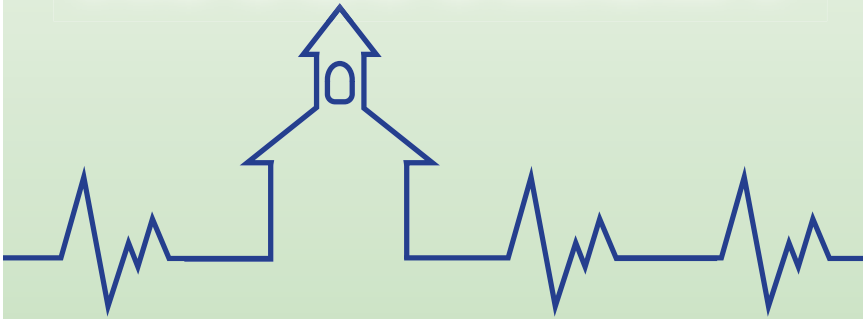

This transfer will require some careful attention to detail to ensure accuracy with the aligned score sheet. Add the numbers to see your results. The questions are aligned in groups of three pulled from specific chapters, (e.g., questions 2, 15, and 17 all indicate how well your families are in preparing kids with a biblical worldview from chapter 4). If you score lower on these three questions or any of the other groupings, you will be able to review that specific topic or area by looking in the corresponding chapter and discover recommendations and resources to see improvements.

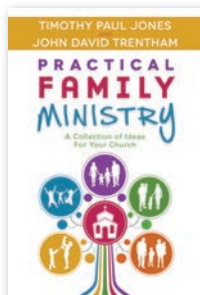

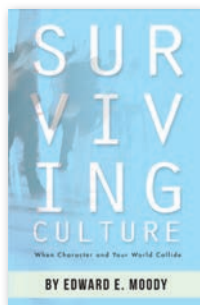

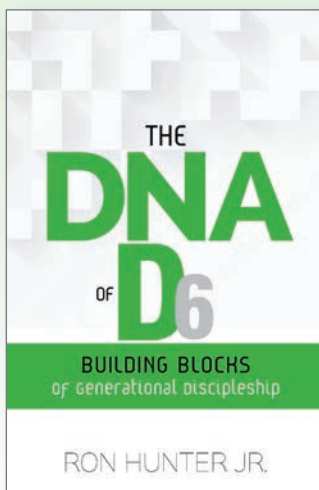
